

Other Kiplings in Australia

The first two Kiplings known to have travelled to **Australia** were both transported convicts, John (1828) and another John (1830). One other Kipling was transported later, Joseph Ackroyd (1864). See 'Transported!'. It is not recorded that any had children.

The first voluntary emigrant appears to have been Arthur Kipling in 1852; see immediately below. Others followed, and this note covers each family or individual in order of arrival (or first record) in Australia.


The poet and author Rudyard Kipling visited Australia briefly in 1891.

The family of William Kipling of Blinman, South Australia (arrived before 1868) are covered separately in 'The Kiplings of Blinman'.

John Stewart Kipling and family

In 1851, John was practicing as a solicitor in London (see 'John Kipling, Mathematician'). He and wife Maria had eleven children, of whom one died young (Christiana).

His son Arthur arrived at Port Phillip in Victoria in October 1852 on the *Scindian*. He left England a clerk but became a miner, presumably for gold (which may have been his intent all along of course).

ASSAULT ON A BAILIFF.—Mr. Kipling, a resident at Richmond, was charged at the District Court on Wednesday by Christian Heier, a bailiff, with assaulting him in the execution of his duty. The complainant had gone to Kipling's house to levy a distraint, and the defendant quietly put him out, disputing the authority under which he acted. Mr. Barton, barrister, appeared for the defendant, and contended that the distraint being illegal the defendant had a right to caution the bailiff, and, on his persisting in retaining possession, to quietly put him out, which was done. The case involving a question of disputed right, the charge of assault was dismissed.

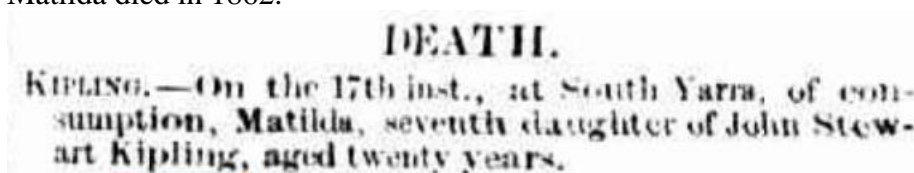

The Age. 4 Sept 1866

Mary Kipling died in Victoria in 1871. An inquest revealed the cause of death:

said Mary Kipling - aged 69 years - came
by her death, do say upon their oath that § about half past six o'clock
A.M.: on the 30th instant the deceased Mary Kipling
came suddenly by her death at her residence 11 Laramie
Street Sandhills from hypertrophy of her heart and
from disease of its Mitral Valves - There were
no marks of violence externally upon the body.

The inquest contained the following statement from a companion.

A cabman told was to have
called for her yesterday morning to bring her to Mr. Bell's School
where she taught drawing.

And this from her nephew-in-law

This Deponent* Charles Snow, the 31st day of March 1871 -
on his oath saith, I am a Loyal Mining Manager at Sandhills
residing at Dorkley Lane Sandhills -
The deceased Miss Mary Kipling was my wife and
deceased was 69 years old, and for her age was generally a
healthy woman. I never knew she had heart disease, but I
have known that the clash excitement for three months past
would affect her breathing - and then she complained of her

drawing, and teaching music - deceased was a very sober
woman

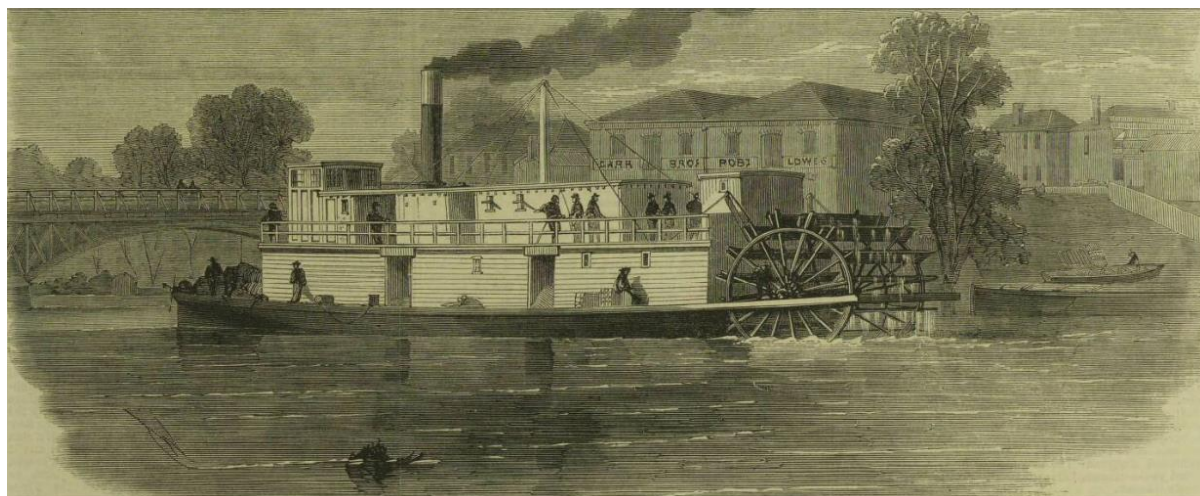

THE LADY DALY, AN AUSTRALIAN RIVER STEAMER.

THIS vessel—of which we give an Engraving, from a photograph taken by Mr. Arthur Kipling—runs on the river Murray, Australia. She is the first steamer that has visited the port of the district for some years. The Centaur sailed from Melbourne on the 18th of July last, and arrived on the 24th at Port Elliott, where her cargo was transhipped to the Lady Daly, which completed her voyage up the Murray in less than six weeks. Especial interest attaches to this event, as it is looked upon as the beginning of a great inland trade in Australia by the navigation of its rivers.

Amongst the details recorded were that Arthur had been a photographer, that he was blind, that he was accustomed to drink to excess occasionally and that he had recently had an accident (see below) which was not deemed to have been the cause of the cerebral haemorrhage; rather this was attributed to the kidney disease also found during the autopsy.

It's notable that sister Harriet was also insane, the third sibling to be adjudged so. Hopefully, they eventually traced his other relatives.

Henry

Henry seems to have been a (too)competitive oarsman as a young man.

The entries for the race were James Mitchell and A. Nichols, W. Wallen and F. Wallan, J. Buchanan and H. Kipling, and John Mitchell and R. Mitchell. The Wallens, however, did not take part in the race, having determined, on the night of entries, not to row against James Mitchell and A. Nichols, who, it seems, are tacitly acknowledged to be the amateur champions of the Yarra. Buchanan and Kipling were at the starting point at the time appointed, though not according to the order on the card, and insisted on pulling over the course, although the other crews had not made their appearance. They carried out this determination, and claimed the prize. The race afterwards came off between James Mitchell with Nichols against the brothers John and R. Mitchell, and was won by the former, who then offered to row Buchanan and Kipling; but the latter declined, on the ground that they had won the prize by a row over.

The criminal sittings of the Supreme Court were continued before Mr. Justice A'Beckett and juries of 12 yesterday. Mr. Finlayson prosecuted for the Crown. John Murray and John Manning, charged with assaulting Henry Kipling, clerk, of Royal Park, on the 21st February, with intent to rob, were defended by Mr. Fisher and acquitted.



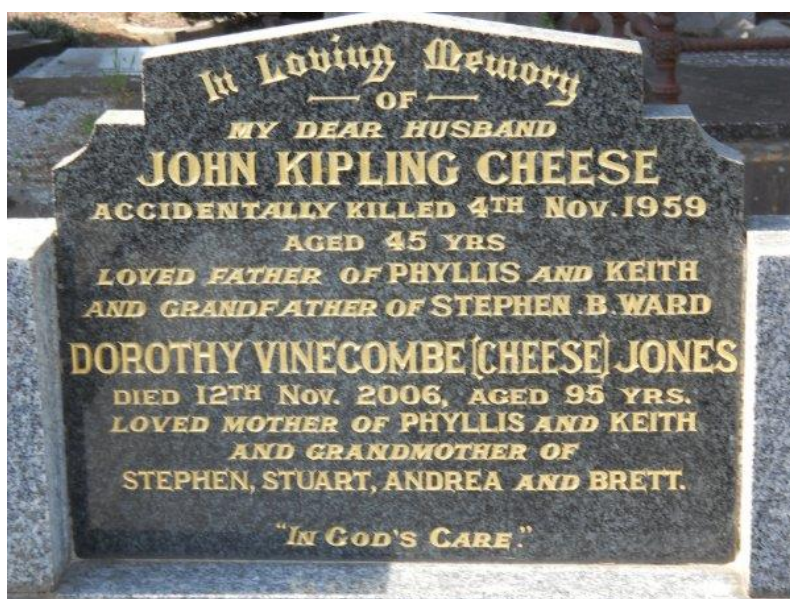

William Stewart Kipling

William Stewart (latterly 'Stuart') was a packer all his life and appears to have remained single. He died in 1955 and with him the male line of this Kipling family died out in Australia, as it had by then in the UK (see 'Moses Kipling – Ironmonger').

Jonathan Kipling

Jonathan was born in Arkengarthdale in 1825 (see 'Arkengarthdale 1911'). He was a joiner in Shields in 1851. He emigrated to Tasmania in 1853, with the wife he had married that year, Isabelle.

The first of four surviving letters from him to his brother Robert in Middleton-in-Teesdale was dated February 1854 from Brisbane and tells of the 88-day voyage, of wages and prices, of the exotic types of crops growing (melons, pineapples, etc), of snakes and cockroaches, and of their reactions at meeting the aboriginal inhabitants for the first time ('they go almost naked ... and are most ignorant, the gospel not having reached their hearts'). Jonathan ends by saying that they expect to be going either to Sydney, or to Tasmania where Isabelle's uncle lives.

The next letter was dated October 1856, and tells that they have now arrived in Hobart, Tasmania and have a small, rented cottage, although have bought land and plan to build their own home. They comment disparagingly on the former prisoners in the community, although add that emigrants will soon outnumber them.

We received a paper from the Robert & Sister 21st 1854
and we have sent several to you which we hope you receive.
My Dear Bro & Sister

The next surviving letter is from 1858. Robert has clearly told them that he has got out of (lead) mining and is becoming a farmer, and Jonathan is pleased, saying that if only he had farming skills he could do even better out here. He also refers to their mother 'in her loneliness' (their father having died in 1856).

Jonathan continued to follow the joinery trade, as the newspaper advertisement below shows.



**THE LATE MR JONATHAN KIPLING,
 FORMERLY OF SOUTH SHIELDS.**

The following memoir of the late Mr Jonathan
 Kipling has been communicated to the *Melbourne
 Wesleyan Record*, of the 2nd September, 1872.
 Mr Kipling formerly resided in South Shields,
 whence his parents had emigrated when he
 was but seven years of age. He was appren-
 ticed to the business of a joiner in that town,
 and was afterwards employed at the Jarrow
 Chemical Company's Works. In the Wesleyan
 circles of South Shields he was well and favour-
 ably known. He was a constant attendant at the
Templetown Wesleyan Chapel, in the Sunday

School at which place of worship he regularly
 taught a class; and his memory is now cherished
 by numbers of his old scholars and friends. Mr
 Kipling emigrated when he was about 20 years of
 age. It is pleasing to know that his departure
 from his native land was not left unmarked.
 About the time of his leave-taking a soiree was
 held to celebrate the opening of the Jarrow
 Chemical Company's Schools, and on that occa-
 sion, Mr Kipling, who was present, received the
 best wishes of the various speakers. In the new
 country to which he went, Mr Kipling, as the
 subjoined memoir will show, continued his career
 of Christian activity:—

The late Mr Jonathan Kipling was born Feb-
 ruary 14, 1825, in the Parish of Arkindale, in the
 North Riding of Yorkshire. His parents were
 both members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church;
 and it is interesting to know that his mother's
 parents were the first to open their door to the
 venerable John Wesley when on his visits to Tees-
 dale.


An account of his death is also given in the same article:

During this time he alluded to his death, and said all fear was removed. After a few days he seemed to rally, and hope was entertained that he would recover. But the Disposer of all events had ordained it otherwise. He continued in this uncertain state until Sabbath morning, the 7th April, when he rallied for a short time, and began to sing the hymn commencing "O happy day that fixed my choice," with much feeling. He spoke of the presence of angels, and said "Oh! do you not see them, they are all around." About 11 o'clock a.m. he became much worse, so that all hope of his recovery was entirely dispelled. Toward the end his mind wandered, but at every lucid interval his testimony was clear as to his acceptance with God through the merits of Jesus Christ. At 5 p.m. on Saturday, April 7th, his spirit passed away from earth to mingle with the redeemed throng before the throne of God. What an eventful Sabbath to him! Commenced with pain and extreme feebleness, but ended as no human tongue or language can describe. A blessed exchange indeed! A glorious transition!

Daughter Isabella Sarah was the mother of Rudyard Noel Kipling Beedham, K.C., solicitor-general of Tasmania from 1939-1944.

William Harker Kipling

William was also born in Arkengarthdale (see 'Arkengarthdale 1911'). He does not appear to have been recorded in the 1861 UK census and it is possible that he was the William Kipling who arrived in Victoria, Australia on board the *Caribou* in March 1858. The next definite record of him emerges only in 1876, when he married in Bendigo, Victoria.



Mr. William Harker Kipling died at his residence, Reginald-street, Quarry Hill, on Friday, after a protracted illness, at the age of 78 years. The deceased gentleman was a native of Yorkshire, England, but had lived in this State for 53 years. Four daughters and one son are left to mourn their loss. The funeral took place on Sunday, and was largely attended, his remains being interred in the Anglican section of the Bendigo Cemetery. The coffin-bearers were:—Messrs. J. Cogley, P. Martin, J. Joseph and Mary Kipling

Joseph Kipling and his sister Mary arrived in Brisbane in Jan 1864 on the *Light of the World*, a ship of the Black Line carrying emigrants from the UK to Australia. They were cousins of John Lockwood Kipling, Rudyard's father (see 'Rudyard 1911').

Joseph's death is recorded in Cairns in 1918, where the names of his parents identify him, as does the age of 78 on an inscription in Martyn Street cemetery, Cairns. There is no evidence of a marriage or children. He's pictured below, probably shortly after his arrival in Australia.



Mary (pictured in old age), married a George WILKINSON in Queensland in March 1864, just six weeks after arriving, and died just 3 months after her brother in 1918.



John Robert Kipling

John Robert was born at Yew Tree Farm, Hury, Baldersdale in 1891 (see 'Cragg 1911'). With his brother James Henry, he arrived in Sydney on board the *Thermistocles* in January 1912.

Assault Case: In Goondiwindi Court of Petty Sessions Alexander David Gordon, accountant, appeared to answer a complaint by Mrs Amy Evelyn Kipling that he had unlawfully assaulted her on December 13. Mr E. D. Fletcher appeared for the defendant and Mr R. J. Leeper, of Warwick, conducted the case for the complainant. Mr E. D. Smart, SM, was on the Bench.

Amy Evelyn Kipling testified that on September 28, 1946, she let part of her premises to the defendant and his wife. The premises were rented to Gordon and his wife for a fortnight, but not more than three weeks. The portion rented was one bedroom and the use of the kitchen. On December 13 she prepared a notice to quit, and gave it to her son to serve on defendant. Her son walked into the kitchen and she followed him. Her son handed defendant the notice. Witness then walked back out on to the verandah and picked up some of her property and went to walk into the kitchen again. Her intention was to put her property away in the kitchen cabinet. As she walked into the kitchen an attempt was made to shut the door in her face. However, she walked in, and defendant was sitting at the table in the kitchen.

en. He got up off his chair and walked over and took her by the shoulders with his two hands and pushed her back against the wall. She said to him, "Let me go. I want to put my things in the cabinet." Defendant's wife spoke to him, and he then let witness go.

Cross-examined by Mr Fletcher, witness said that she asked defendant and his wife to go because they were only to be in the premises for a fortnight or three weeks. She denied that her action in locking up the crockery was part of a plan to induce them to leave.

Re-examined by Mr Leeper, Mrs Kipling said that defendant and his wife used to follow her about the house calling her insulting names. They were noisy until 12 o'clock at night.

Corroborative evidence was given by Phyllis Robertson, Desmond Kipling and Fay Kipling.

Defendant, who pleaded not guilty, deposed that up to the time of his receiving notice to quit there had been no request to him to vacate the premises. Both he and his wife had searched Goondiwindi night and day for accommodation. On the night of the alleged assault he and his wife were seated at a table in the kitchen having their evening meal. When Desmond Kipling came into the kitchen to hand him a note he was followed by Mrs Robertson, Defendant's wife

complained about their presence near the doorway and asked if they would please stay away and let them have their meal in peace. Defendant stated that when Mrs Kipling came into the kitchen and went to the cabinet he had his back turned to her. He denied having touched Mrs Kipling. He had never followed her about calling her insulting names. It was untrue that he and his wife banged on the walls and floor and called out, "Come out here you —"

Warwick Daily News 3 February 1947

Cross-examined by Mr Leeper defendant said that he and his wife had met with refusals in their search for accommodation, but had been given an explanation. He had not been told that they were not wanted.

Evidence in support of defendant was given by Margaret Ann Gordon.

The Bench found for the complainant, and Gordon was convicted and fined £1 and ordered to pay witness' expenses amounting to £2, 6/ costs of court, and £5/5/ professional costs, in default a month in Brisbane gaol.

COLLISION NEAR BOWEN BRIDGE.

Horse Killed and Three Men Injured.

At about 7.30 o'clock last night, a collision occurred between a cab and a motorcar on the Bowen Bridge road. The motorcar was coming from the direction of Kedron, and when nearing the General Hospital, collided with the horse and cab, which was crossing the road, from the opposite direction. There were two passengers, besides the driver, in the motorcar, and they were thrown violently to the ground, whilst the motorcar swerved sharply across the road, and then turned completely over. The cab did not receive much damage, but the horse, which received the full force of the collision, was killed.

The occupants of the car were Maurice Kipling, who received a large laceration on the right hand, a punctured wound on the chin, and abrasions to the nose and forehead, Leslie Munro, who suffered internal injuries and abrasions on the chest and nose, and the driver, Jack Pullen, who was cut by the glass from the wind screen, which was broken, sustained incised wounds on the cheek and forehead, and suffered from shock. They were all taken to the General Hospital for attention.

The cab driver, Thomas Hayes, was uninjured. The police are investigating the circumstances surrounding the collision.

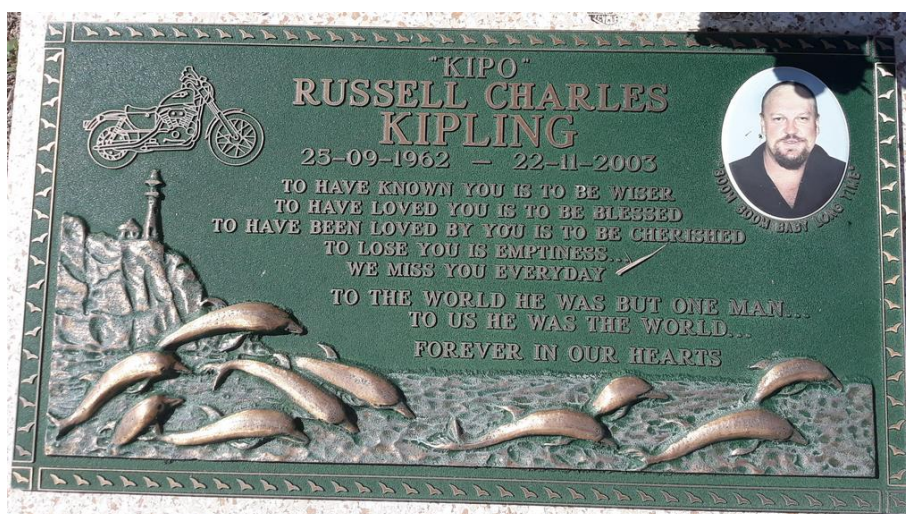

Herbert joined the Army in March 1916, giving his age as 19yrs and 6mo and with the enlistment form allegedly signed by his grandmother and guardian, Charlotte Brown. He states that his parents are not known, although on another form he initially writes John Kipling as his father then crosses it out. He was discharged, apparently for being under age, in June of the same year.

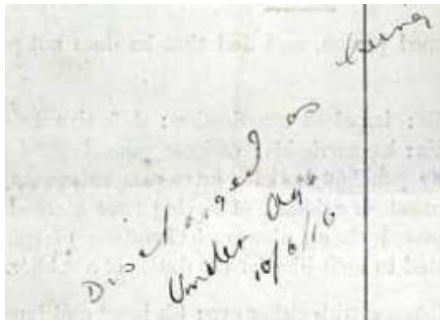

KIPLING'S KLASH.

Boxer Boxes on with a Braco of Bobbies

Herbert Kipling, said to be a professional pugilist, faced a bench of beaks at the Fitzroy Court on Tuesday, when three charges were preferred against him, as follows: Behaving in an offensive manner, using obscene language, and resisting arrest.

Evidence was given by Constable Paddy Gooden as to what happened in Young-street at 12.45 a.m. on Sunday. When Kipling left a house in that thoroughfare with a young lady, and started pulling her about all over the place, a general uproar ensued. The language used, said witness, was a bit above the average, even for Young-street. When an attempt was made to arrest Kipling, that young man brought his ring craft into play, and this resulted in an "all in" go between the pair of them. **Kipling** resisted so violently that he was not over-powered until Constable Scales came to the assistance of witness.

Kipling, whose left eye was in deep mourning, explained that he was a pugilist by profession and a brass finisher by occupation. His only explanation was that he had been drinking heavily, and the booze went to his head.

Mr. J. J. Denton, J.P. (chairman): Your language was very bad, and your conduct worse.

Kipling: But just fancy a little fellow like me resisting a couple of big men like Gooden and Scales!

On the first charge, a fine of 20s., or seven days, was imposed; while on each of the other two charges the fines were 40s., or 14 days. The needful was promptly produced by **Kipling**.

Truth. Saturday 19 October 1918

Grace Stewart, a well-dressed girl, was charged with having insufficient lawful means of support. It was stated by the police that accused was frequently about the streets at night accosting men, and was in the habit of visiting the house carried on by the previous defendant.

It was sworn by accused and **Herbert Kipling**, brass finisher, Nicholson-street, that they were occupying the same house in Nicholson-street. Accused was house-keeping for **Kipling**, and he allowed her 25/ per week for herself, in addition to paying the household expenses.

In view of the evidence for the defence the bench dismissed the case.

MAN SHOT

EAST MELBOURNE MYSTERY

WOUNDED VICTIM REFUSES INFORMATION

INQUIRER BY TELEPHONE

MELBOURNE, Thursday.

Last night the police were informed that a man had been shot on the Jolimont-road, East Melbourne. On proceeding to the spot they found a man lying in the roadway with a bullet wound in the chest.

The man declined to give any information, and on being asked his name, replied: "Oh, guess it! Ted Gessit." He said he was 27 years old, but he appears much older. He said a man shot him, but when asked for the reason he replied: "Nothing!" His clothing was saturated with blood, from the loss of which he became very weak, and was removed to the Melbourne Hospital.

Meanwhile a woman had telephoned the news to the detective office, and a little later a clerk at the casualty ward was summoned to the telephone, and a man's voice asked if **Herbert Kipling** had been admitted. When asked the nature of **Kipling's** injuries, he replied that he had been shot. The inquirer said he would visit the hospital, but so far he has failed to do so.

In the locality where the wounded man was picked up there are several houses of ill-fame.

Mysterious Shooting

Man's Condition Critical

No arrest had been effected up to this afternoon. In connection with the shooting incident in Jolimont street, Jolimont, last evening, when Herbert Kipling, 23, brass-finisher, and a well-known boxer, was shot in the chest.

Kipling was operated upon in the Melbourne Hospital at midnight. There was no improvement this afternoon in his condition, which is still critical, and does not permit of his being questioned about the occurrence.

The neighborhood where the shooting took place is a quiet one, and few people were about at the time. The house which it is believed Kipling was visiting faces the Yarra Park.

Late this afternoon Kipling was in a comatose condition. The operation disclosed that the bullet had smashed the collarbone, and injured the jugular vein. It was deemed inadvisable to attempt to remove the bullet.

JOLIMONT SHOOTING CASE.

VICTIM'S CONDITION LOW

DECLINES TO NAME ASSAILANT

In their effort to elucidate the mystery surrounding the shooting of a man believed to be Herbert Kipling at East Melbourne on Wednesday night, Detectives Pigott and Ashton have as yet been unsuccessful. The wounded man, who lies at Melbourne Hospital in a critical condition with a bullet wound in his chest, has refused to give any information whatever as to how he was shot or who shot him, and although the detectives questioned residents of the locality in which the shooting is believed to have taken place, not the smallest clue to the circumstances could be obtained. During yesterday a man, who said he was a friend of Kipling, called at the hospital, and he was interviewed by the detectives, but he denied having any knowledge of the affair.

As a consequence of his injuries the victim of the shooting yesterday lost consciousness. But prior to that development he was asked whether he desired to send any messages to relatives. He replied that his only relations were his parents, and that he did not want them to hear about his trouble.

Reference in Court.

At the General Sessions yesterday, Mr. H. Shelton, appearing for Herbert Kipling, who had lodged an appeal against a conviction at Carlton on a charge of having goods in his possession which were believed to be stolen, informed Judge Woinarski that he believed appellant to be identical with a man who had been shot at Jolimont on the previous night and who was now in Melbourne Hospital. Judge Woinarski agreed to adjourn the case until next month.

October 15, 1920 The Age

What is probably the last phase of one of Melbourne's many shooting mysteries passed from public notice yesterday, with the discharge of Herbert Stivey, better known as Herbert Kipling, boxer, from Melbourne Hospital. On the night of 13th October last, Kipling was found lying on the roadway at Jolimont-street, East Melbourne, with a bullet wound in his breast. He was taken to Melbourne Hospital, where detectives questioned him concerning the manner in which he had been wounded, but although his wound was grave, and, at the time there was little expectation of his recovery, the injured man refused to tell the detectives who had shot him. From their inquiries the police formed the opinion that the shot had been fired by a woman, but in the absence of a statement by Kipling they were unable to obtain any direct evidence in the case. And there the matter rests.

November 20, 1920 *The Age*

At the same court, Herbert Kipling, who had been sentenced to three months' imprisonment on a charge of having property in his possession reasonably supposed to have been stolen, asked for relief from the sentence as he required special medical attention. Mr. Shelton, for the appellant, said that his client had been shot in the arm at Jolimont during an argument, and his injured limb required treatment by the doctor who had previously attended to it. His Honor confirmed the sentence, but decided to call the gaol authorities' attention to the condition of the man's arm.

November 27, 1920 *The Age*

APPEAL UPHELD.

In the Court of General Sessions yesterday Herbert Kipling appealed against convictions of the court of petty sessions at Carlton of offensive behavior and obstructing the police, on which he was sentenced to one month and three months' imprisonment respectively. Judge Dethridge upheld the appeal and quashed the convictions, remarking that at the time of the alleged offences there was considerable confusion, and Senior Constable Lewis might have been mistaken as to the man who called out the offensive words alleged to have been used, and which were supposed to lead to the alleged obstruction.

NOTICE OF APPEAL AGAINST SENTENCE.

Herbert Kipling, aged 26 years, of Carlton street, Carlton, was charged at the Northcote Court on Monday, before Messrs. Hayes, Keane, Cohen, Jones, and Dyke, J.P.'s, with having had in his possession two pairs of goloshes which it was suspected had been stolen. He was also charged with having stolen a pair of boots, valued at 18/9, the property of Alfred Hutton. Sub-inspector Mahoney prosecuted.

William Gribble, boot retailer, of High street, Northcote, said that on July 2, while two men were in his shop, Kipling came to the door and asked for a cigarette. One of the men then went away with Kipling. When they had gone he noticed that several pairs of goloshes were missing. Constable Wiley and witness followed the men. They saw Kipling throw something into the garden of a house in Helen street. Witness recovered a pair of boots and several goloshes from the garden. When arrested Kipling had a pair of goloshes in his inside pocket, and later handed another pair to the constable. The goloshes were his property.

Herbert Kipling said that he went to the Carriers' Arms Hotel on the morning of July 2, and met two men, whose names he did not know. Later witness again met the men, whom he was with all the afternoon. The men went into Mrs. Cornell's house in Helen street to get a roll of matting. Witness held the goloshes for them, and while he was waiting for the men he was arrested. He knew one of the men as "Bluey."

Alfred C. W. B. Hutton, boot retailer, High street, Northcote, said that he saw Kipling outside his shop on July 2. After Kipling had left he missed a pair of youth's boots.

Kipling was sentenced to three months' imprisonment on the charge of possession, and to one month's imprisonment on the second charge, the sentences to be concurrent. Notice of appeal was given by Mr. A. L. Read, who appeared for Kipling. Bail was fixed at one surety of £50 in each case.

Alleged Attempted Blackmail.

TWO ACCUSED REMANDED.

Charged with having on Friday last demanded the sum of £75 from John Brister with menaces, Herbert Kipling and Herbert Farley appeared at the City Court yesterday morning. On an application of the police both men were remanded for seven days, bail being fixed at £150 each, and one surety each of £150.

Farley and Kipling were arrested by Plain-clothes Constable O'Connell at East Melbourne. It is alleged that on Saturday last Farley met Brister by appointment, and took him to Wellington-parade, East Melbourne, where they met Kipling. It was said that Kipling had previously arranged that Brister should pay £75 to have proceedings in a divorce case stopped.

5 August 1924. *The Age*

Herbert Kipling, brassfinisher, was ordered eighteen months' imprisonment, and Hubert James Farley, draper, six months, for having conspired to obtain money from John Brister.

His Honor mentioned that Farley had been convicted of conspiracy with a man whom he knew to be a crook and a jury squarer, and whom he had, in fact, joined to play a sort of confidence trick. Farley had no previous convictions, but Kipling had a long list for offences of various kinds.

In Carlton court yesterday, Herbert Kipling, brass finisher, was charged with having had in his possession an unregistered pistol.

Plain-clothes Constable Newlands said he saw defendant with two other men in Drummond-street at 6 p.m. on 4th inst. Witness's suspicions were aroused by their conduct, and he took them to the police station. On Kipling he found a new magazine pistol.

Defendant, who admitted prior convictions, was fined £25.

A further charge of having loitered with intent to commit a felony, was dismissed.

STOLEN MOTOR CYCLE.

Owner's Brother Charged With Receiving.

Herbert Kipling, 31 years, brass finisher, was charged at Fitzroy court yesterday with having, between 8th April and 28th October last, received a motor cycle and side car knowing them to have been stolen.

Rex Stivey, etcher, of Council-street, Clifton Hill, said accused was his brother.

The Age (Melbourne, Vic. : 1854 - 1954) Friday 11 November 1927

The case for the Crown was that Rex Stivey, etcher, of Council street, Clifton Hill, brother of Kipling, left his motor-cycle and sidecar in the parking area at the Motordrome on the evening of April 8. He next saw it in Smith street in the possession of a man named Hearnden. Hearnden was committed for trial, but was acquitted. The machine was recovered after the trial. Evidence given by detectives was that on October 28 they went to a house in Birkenhead street, North Fitzroy, and in the backyard found the motor-cycle and sidecar. Kipling told the detectives that the machine belonged to his brother and that while the case against Hearnden was pending a man had approached him and said, "Do you want your brother's motor-cycle back." Kipling replied, "Yea." The man said, "If you come to the corner of Scotchmere street and Station street after dark to-night you can have it." Kipling went. He admitted to the detectives that he did not tell his brother that he had the motor-cycle, but he added, "One of the conditions on which I received the motor-cycle was that I should not tell my brother until the case against Hearnden was over."

Kipling denied on oath that he had any intention of depriving his brother of the motor-cycle.

Judge Macindoe.—I have never had a case anything like this before. If a man knowing a bicycle has been stolen has a chance of getting it for the owner and he takes that chance, is he guilty of an offence?

Mr. Sproule.—If the jury accept his story they would not find him guilty.

Kipling was discharged.

CONSORTING CHARGE DISMISSED

"Senior-Detective Lambell told me that the new law was drastic, and that I was not allowed to have a friend," said Herbert Kipling, 35, manufacturer, Station Street, Carlton, when charged at the Fitzroy Court today with having been an idle and disorderly person, in that, between June and October, he had habitually consorted with reputed thieves.

Detectives said they had warned Kipling on and near racecourses when he was associated with various reputed thieves and ticket snatchers. They said he had been warned particularly in respect of a man named Hunt.

When a statement was made as to Kipling's character, Mr Goldberg, who appeared for him, objected and pointed out that there was no provision in the Consorting Act which allowed evidence of the accused's character.

MEN REMOVED TO GAOL.

SOME LIVELY STREET MEETINGS.

Port Pirie, June 24.

Five more members of the Industrial Workers of the World went to the Gladstone Gaol yesterday. They were speakers whose names were taken on Friday night for having refused to move on when requested to do so by the police. Their names were Leslie St. Clair Roberts, Frederick Kieper, Martin Peterson, Frederick Buntger, and Samuel Kipling. The Police Court proceedings were presided over by Mr. S. J. Mitchell, S.M., who in each case inflicted a fine of £5 and costs, in default 21 days' imprisonment. All the defendants refused to pay the fines, and were escorted to the Gladstone Gaol by the noon train.

Quite unexpectedly (says the Port Pirie "Recorder") the I.W.W. members who were imprisoned last month for street speaking at Port Pirie arrived home by the late passenger train on Friday night. The men were released from the Gladstone Gaol on Friday, after having served varying term of detention. The names of the released men are: Leslie St. Clair Roberts, Frederick Kieper, Martin Peterson, Frederick Buntger, Samuel Kipling, Thomas Cherrington, Charles Arring, and George Paton. The first five men were sentenced to three weeks on June 23, and the other three to one month on June 25. The first batch, therefore, served two weeks and four days, whilst the second batch were detained a little over a fortnight.

I.W.W. LECTURER FINED.

Samuel Kipling pleaded guilty to a charge that, being an alien resident in the Commonwealth, he did fail to register not later than October 31, 1916.

Inspector Miller said that the defendant had been in Broken Hill for several weeks, and had made statements to the police that were afterwards proved to be incorrect. Those statements were regarding his residence in Sydney. Defendant was an intelligent man; in fact, he was an I.W.W. lecturer, and he could find no excuse for him.

The magistrate: What nationality is the defendant?

Defendant: I am American born. I was ignorant that the law applied to American born.

The magistrate: How long have you been in this country?

The defendant: Five years.

The magistrate: Surely you read the papers.

The defendant: Yes, but I was ignorant of the fact that the law applied to American born.

The magistrate (to the defendant): One would think you would take notice of anything referring to aliens, knowing you are an alien. However, I do not intend to deal severely with you. Are you resident here now?

The defendant: Yes.

The magistrate: You are American born, but of what parentage?

The defendant: My parents were born in Russia.

The magistrate: I fine the defendant £1 and 6/ costs—in default, seven days' hard labor. He is American born, and that should meet the case.

POLICE COURT PROCEEDINGS.

32 MEN SENTENCED.

EACH TO SIX MONTHS' HARD LABOR.

The men who were arrested on Saturday night and yesterday on charges of being members of an unlawful association, to wit, the I.W.W., were brought before the Police Court this morning. The accommodation in the court for the public was fully taken up.

Each of the men were charged—

For that, at Broken Hill, in the State of New South Wales, on and since the 26th day of August, 1917, he was and did continue to be, a member of an unlawful association, to wit, the association known as the Industrial Workers of the World.

Superintendent Miller: The accused are members of the I.W.W. On Saturday night they congregated at the intersection of Chloride and Argent streets for the purpose of holding a meeting. Graham was arrested by Inspector Fullerton after announcing himself a member of the I.W.W. This procedure continued until some 28 men were under arrest. One of the accused, on being charged, in the presence of the others, said, "You have got the greatest gang of criminals in the world." After arresting these men we visited their rooms, and got a great deal of their literature, including copies of "Direct Action." Each man at their meetings has announced that they intended to defy the Act, and said they would not deny membership.

The magistrate: In the past few months two members of this unlawful association have been hanged and 12 have been sentenced to long terms of imprisonment. Yet each of these accused continues to be a member of an association which has been declared by the people of Australia to be unlawful.

The other accused were then charged, and all pleaded guilty. They were:—
Samuel Kipling (24), miner, United States of America.

The magistrate sentenced each of the accused to six months' imprisonment with hard labor.


